




Open Position Chords: 7th

Next, there are a few "7" chords, sometimes called "Dominant 7". These are played in the "open" position. These contain 4 tones.






#### Barre Chords: Major


Moving on, while the open chords were the easiest to play. now we have barre chords which are a little harder.
